

Creating Landscapes Learning Center, Inc., doing business as Creating Landscapes, continued its tradition of community support and involvement and expanded its reach through collaborative efforts with other community agencies and groups. We celebrate the excellent work of our three learning venues — Creating Landscapes for Families, the Creating Landscapes Early Learning Center, and Food4Thought.

Our venues enjoy a great deal of autonomy and independence while still benefiting from the support and encouragement of our experienced Creating Landscapes leaders and our Advisory Council members with particular expertise in various fields such as legal matters, insurance, fiscal management, personnel policies and marketing.

We have been grateful for the success of Crawford Gives in supporting our work and allowing us wider visibility in the community. Through the generosity of dozens of donors, Creating Landscapes, Inc. is able to fund basic services for our venues like insurance and web presence. Also, during this past year beautiful new signs were installed for the Families Early Learning Center, the Creating Landscapes for Families Garden and the Children's Garden.

Our venues have continued to prosper and grow

The Creating Landscapes for Families Early Learning Center plans to expand to include a new classroom and continues to provide exemplary, innovative and enriching preschool experiences for its students while nurturing critical thinking and problem solving.

Food4Thought has been deeply involved in community gardens and nutrition education through Grow Meadville. The growth and community support for the Children's Garden has been especially rewarding. In collaboration with Women's Services, the YMCA and the City of Meadville, a Walkathon for Huidekoper Park playground successfully raised more than \$25,000 to fund summer programming at the park. The program has been very well received in the community and well attended.

Creating Landscapes for Families is maintaining its community of families at

both the South Main Street garden and the Fifth Ward garden.

In addition, we worked in collaboration with one of our former educational venues, The Learning Center K-8 School, to secure a \$108,000 grant from the Green Mountain Energy Sun Club. Grant funds will be used to construct a timber

frame outdoor classroom, made from sustainably harvested logs, nestled in the woods above the ravine at the school's new property. This outdoor classroom will enable Learning Center students and our broader Creating Landscapes community to continue the tradition of experiential learning, incorporating authentic interactions with nature. We look forward to the raising of the classroom in the spring of 2023.





Brenda reminded me that although many things in our program have changed over the years, many things have remained the same. The important things. Brenda told me that...


- "I see people every day picking cucumbers and peppers in our garden. They are taking them for their kids."

- "I had extra and I hope someone can use this soup and cereal."
- Kim then sat with us and talked for a while about the tomatoes she is growing in pots in her yard and invited us to see the "hens and chickens" plants she has started.

And THEN, our five-year old neighbor Legend came speeding over to show us his dirt bike! He was quick to announce that ...

- "Miss Brenda showed me where I can ride so I don't run over the plants."
- "I've been taking care of our pumpkins. I'm making sure no one is picking them until they're ready and then I'll make sure we share."





Because we live in a community that bolsters us with contributions of time and resources, we continue to grow Families Garden on neighborhood land that is offered to us by the generosity of the Meadville Redevelopment Authority.

Brenda, Kim, and Legend remind us that because of our good fortune...

- We offer food for tables; time to talk and listen to each other; and opportunities to learn from each other.
- We give what we can to those who need, and we celebrate one another's ideas and accomplishments.
- We take good care of our place and our work. We share.



OMMUNITY GIVES!

M. Scott Peck said, "There is no adequate one-sentence

definition of community. Community is something more than the sum of its parts, its individual members. The great enemy of community is exclusivity. Groups that exclude others because they are poor or doubters or divorced or sinners or of some different race or nationality are not communities; they are cliques — actually inclusive defensive bastions against community. It is our task — our essential, central, crucial task — to transform ourselves from mere social creatures into community creatures." This quote summarizes Food4Thought's goals this year.

The Children's Garden, the Walkathon and the Huidekoper Park Program were well received by the neighborhoods and community. Many people pitched in to make these programs successful. In doing so, many children and parents participated helping make their community a better place to live. They grew, they learned, they played, they made new friends, transforming themselves into community creatures.

Another initiative this year is, Good To Go 5-2-1-0. Our program is patterned after Maine Health's Let's Go initiative, which is a nationally recognized obesity prevention program for children and adults. It focuses on healthy eating and active living. Jennifer Brady introduced the program to F4T.

Thanks to Jennifer, Maine Health is willing to consider piloting a program in Crawford County. For this to happen, F4T needs to have three entities, a non-profit, school district and medical community.

Ann Areson and Wally Mason have met with Meadville Medical Center personnel, Anne White, Brian MacMurray and Tracy Meure. A meeting with Crawford Central School District K-12 Curriculum Director, Jennifer Galdon, Meadville Medical Center and Food4Thought has been scheduled.
